Dear Kirtland Residents,

There is plenty of good news to share with you as Labor Day 2019 closes in, school has started, and the season changes.

In administration, Duane Martz is our new Interim Service Administrator. Duane brings his knowledge of the City and contracting experience to the position along with an understanding of our stormwater and road issues. The Service Department team is currently finishing up ditch enclosures on SR 306 to help close out the SR306 paving project. The road paving bid package for Booth Road, along with some base repairs for Billings Road, will have been advertised and awaiting bid results for Council approval in September.

A special mention goes out to Justin Gollin, Cemetery Superintendent for his coordination with athletic leagues, the Kirtland Schools, Kirtland Boosters, and Youth Leagues to make improvements to the Recreation Park and fields.

I am pleased to announce that Wayne Baumgart was appointed as the Interim Zoning Inspector effective 8/19/19. The need is clear for ongoing enforcement and resolution of City issues, and the additional burden to the Police Department of handling the lower level issues needing resolved. Retired Chief Baumgart has detailed knowledge of the City, the police department, the workings of the law department, and will work with Zoning Secretary, Denise Roelle to become highly educated on zoning-specific issues. It is my sincere hope that after serving the City in the Interim role, that Council will see the pragmatism and value of his selection and he would be considered for confirmation in that role by Council.

Monica Drake, Kirtland's Economic Development Manager, has been busy working with the Economic Development Standing Committee of Council, and leading the initial joint meeting of the two CRA related boards, Tax Incentive Review and Housing Council. My thanks to those who participated, including Lake County Auditor, Chris Galloway for the initial meeting. Monica, who also works with the cities of Wickliffe and Willowick, can be reached at Mdrake@cityofwickliffe.com to assist with any development questions.

Our City Finance Director, Mary Kovalchik, shared with me that when our new accounting system and software is installed this fall, the City will be able to have Ohio Checkbook for the residents to navigate. While the check register has always been available to see, the Ohio Checkbook format brings us up to date with Lake County, the State of Ohio, and our local schools, who already utilize the Ohio Checkbook program.

Thank you for investing your time and efforts as residents and stakeholders.

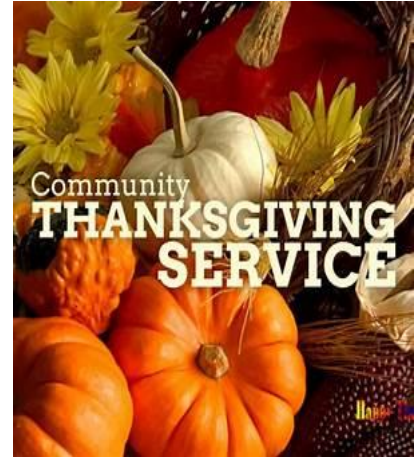
Community Thanksgiving Service

Fire Department Update from Chief Hutton

The Kirtland Fire Department experienced personnel changes this summer. Capt. Dale Grinstead, a 42-year veteran of the department retired. Capt. Grinstead served as a volunteer, and part-time and full-time firefighter throughout his career. He was always there to help anybody at any time with anything, either on or off-duty. He will be missed. Tony Catania, a 17-year member of the department, was promoted to Captain and Aaron Madden, a lifelong Kirtland resident, was hired as full-time firefighter/paramedic.

The News-Herald recently wrote an article addressing the difficulty attracting and retaining part-time firefighters. Kirtland, along with all area departments, has had to deal with this new challenge. The enrollment in fire and paramedic schools have seen a rapid decline. We are now at a point where we must consider hiring additional full-time employees to properly serve our community. We currently staff five firefighters 24/7, between two stations; three full-time and two part-time. Our part-time numbers are down, and we have had difficulty filling the part-time shifts. I recently submitted a proposal to the Mayor and Council to restructure the fire department by adding additional full-time members over a period of three years as well as three Lieutenants. Not only will this plan provide better staffing coverage, but would also assure we always have an officer, either Captain or Lieutenant on-duty.

Unfortunately, violent acts in schools and other places of assembly have been on the rise. The Police and Fire Departments have been working closely with the Kirtland Local Schools and other local groups with emergency preparedness. The West Lake County Fire Chiefs recently developed a response guideline to Active Shooter and other violent acts. This plan includes the Rescue Task Force (RTF) concept which pairs EMS crews with Police protection to enter a "warm zone" and immediately render care to victims. The Kirtland Police and Fire have trained together on this plan and will be holding a full-scale drill in the future. The Kirtland Fire Department is well equipped to respond to violent acts with ballistic vests, ballistic helmets, trauma kits and triage supplies.

As we move into the fall and winter seasons, it's hard for me to believe I have worked for the City of Kirtland for over a year. Throughout this year, some of the investments we have seen include a facelift on the Kirtland Plaza, the Kirtlander revamped and reopened under new ownership, the Kirtland Creamery constructed and opened, and the Kirtland Veterinary Hospital under construction. There are other projects in the works or being considered, which will help boost the economy of the city, while still maintaining the charm and feel of Kirtland.

An outline for the Strategic Plan, which is used to identify goals and objectives for Kirtland, was developed based on input from the February 6, 2019 kickoff meeting. City leaders have been working together to prioritize goals and are working on developing action steps to achieve them. Peaceful, family and community were the three most common one-word descriptions used by Kirtland residents during the strategic planning meeting. These three words really describe the essence of why people live, work, and invest in Kirtland, as well as, help set the tone for development.

I am looking forward to the fall and winter events held throughout the city. I've learned much by attending them, being educated on the history, the mission, dreams and needs of our various community organizations and businesses. Working together, we can address challenges, become dream makers, and develop the city in a balanced manner. Please feel free to reach out to myself, the Mayor, or Council with development ideas. We are here to support you and provide guidance, when needed.

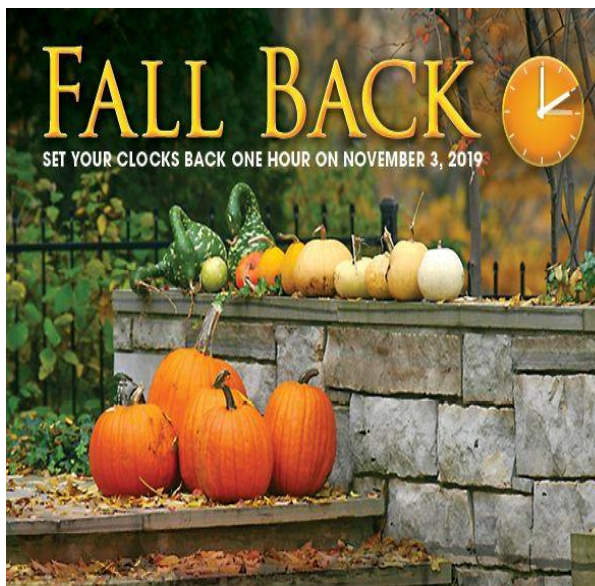

Bring your documents to be shredded for **FREE!**

All Kirtland residents are welcome to bring up to three bankers size boxes.

- Proof of residency is **REQUIRED** (i.e. drivers' license or utility bill).
- Staples and paper clips do not need to be removed in advance.
- Limit of 3 bankers size boxes per household. A banker's box (15x12x10) is approximately the same size as a copy paper box for standard letter size paper.
- Please bring documents in a container that can be discarded.
- If you intend to witness your documents being shredded, be prepared to wait. Shredding is done on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Monitors and hard drives will **NOT** be accepted.

Snow Plowing Reminder

As we approach winter, note that pushing driveway snow or depositing snow on streets is strictly prohibited by City of Kirtland Ordinance §412.06.

The intent of this ordinance is to eliminate hazards created by leaving ridges of snow in the street, which creates sight hazards, and blocking ditches which impedes the normal flow of water. If seen, please report it to the Kirtland Police Department at 440-256-3333.

Anyone who violates this ordinance will be subject to a fine.



Our city plows work hard to keep your streets safe. Please help them by remembering the snow parking ban whenever the snow exceeds two inches during a period of 24 hours or less.

Kirtland Police Department – Chief Nosse’s Notes

New Crosswalks Added to the City!

Providing maximum safety is the City's number one priority. As the new school year approaches, it is the perfect time to highlight the responsibilities of motorists and pedestrians regarding the City's two new crosswalks.

On Monday, July 15, 2019 Kirtland Middle School Student, Maddy Skingel, was the first person to activate Kirtland's new crosswalk and initiate its inaugural crossing. The signal activated crosswalk is located across from Kirtland Schools' Rogers Field and connects to the shopping plaza. The crosswalk in downtown functions with a push button to activate the signal which operates the same way a traffic light does. The light cycles to red to stop the motoring public. Once the light changes to red, the pedestrian is given a signal and a flashing time to walk. As a pedestrian, not enter or cross the roadway without first ensuring traffic has stopped.

The second new crosswalk is located at the intersection of Kirtland-Chardon Road and Regency Woods Drive. The crosswalk at this intersection is very different. There are no mechanical traffic control devices to assist pedestrians to cross or to regulate traffic. Therefore, it is of the utmost importance to ensure traffic has stopped in both directions if attempting to cross when traffic is approaching.

The City of Kirtland has invested into providing the safest way possible to cross Chillicothe Road. It is recommended that pedestrians only cross a roadway at an intersection. If a crosswalk is present, use it! The Kirtland Police Department is committed to providing a safe environment for pedestrians, bicyclists, and the motoring public. Cooperation from all involved will ensure maximum safety. The Kirtland Police Department will be monitoring these areas more heavily as the school year begins.

KPD Continuing Education & Training

Sergeant Eric LaTurner completed First Line Supervision and Management this past April. This one-week training program provided supervisory and management training in first line supervision. As a newly promoted Sergeant, this class is important to learn how to manage and supervise other officers. Congratulations Sergeant LaTurner!

These accomplishments are just an example of many classes and training our officers and dispatchers complete throughout the year. Officers and dispatchers complete classes and training in areas that are specialized and that they have a specific interest in, which is often above the state mandated training. Officer Jose Carrillo is part of Lake County SWAT and participates in year-round specialized training. Officer Cassia Phillips attends many classes on domestic violence and hostage negotiation.

Things are Getting Brighter at City Hall

Thanks to grant funds received from NOPEC, the Municipal Center is upgrading all fixtures to new LED bulbs. Energy savings to the City is projected to be \$5,870 annually. NOPEC and NextEra Energy established the NOPEC Energized Community (NEC) Grant Program provides grants to existing NOPEC member electric and gas communities. The primary goal is to provide funds to help communities implement energy savings or energy infrastructure measures. The cost for Kirtland's LED lighting upgrade is \$20,816.78, which was paid entirely with funds received from the NOPEC grant. We expect the lighting upgrade project to be complete by the end of September.

New City Website in the Works

The City is excited to announce that a newly designed Kirtland website is in the works. E-Gov Link was chosen as the website developer for this project and City administration, along with the Public Relations Standing Committee, led by Councilman Rob Skrbis, have been working diligently to create a more user-friendly and up-to-date website. The website will serve as a tool to engage and inform the citizens in the community. The new site will have a sleek new design that works well on a desktop as well as tablet, smart phone, and other mobile devices.

The new site will be profoundly more visually inviting, efficient, and user friendly. The site will include web forms for submissions, such as report a problem, register for an event, and Public Records Requests Council agendas, legislation, and a community.

The launch date is expected sometime in late September and will be announced on line as well as the City's Facebook page @CityofKirtland.

The Kirtland Senior Center serves adults aged 55 and over with quality, affordable programming to provide opportunities for social interaction, recreation, fitness, and minor health and wellness services close to home. The aim is to keep adults active, motivated, and engaged in their community for an optimal quality of life. Don't be misled by the term "senior"! Our programs are for the youngest Baby Boomers through those in their Golden Years. Stop in and see our facility! Classes include strength training, aerobics, balance, tai chi, and several styles of yoga. Wellness services include reflexology, reiki, massage, light therapy, podiatry, and polarity. Programs at KSC are funded by the Kirtland Recreation and Senior Levy and the Lake County Senior Citizens Services Levy.
